




The other side printed with "Euryclea discovers Ulysses". The recognition of Ulysses (Odysseus) by his old

nurse comes from much later in the Odyssey. The choice of these two disconnected episodes from a very long story to illustrate this vase suggests that whoever chose them did not know the story. The prints were copied from John Flaxman's illustrations to the Odyssey, which were reprinted many times after their first publication in 1793.

Unglazed terracotta earthenware vase printed with "Ulysses on the hearth presenting himself to Alcinous and Arete" from Homer's Odyssey. Ulysses is the Latin version of the Greek name Odysseus. The Bishops Waltham Clay Company Ltd. exhibited pottery, terracotta and ornamental bricks at the 1867 Paris International Exhibition.
